

Diocesan Finance Fund.—Those who are in the swim of Church life, know that there is no excuse for those who object to contribute to the Diocesan Finance Fund and the Central Church Fund, any more than that any British citizen has a reason for objecting to pay his legitimate share of the rates and taxes for the upkeep of his country, the privileges of which he enjoys. The Church at headquarters has obligations to meet, and so at Diocesan headquarters; consequently the above-named assessments are made on the unquestionable principle, that no parochial unit has any moral justification for shirking its responsibility.

Neither Gt. Sampford nor Hempstead has this year responded to the full extent expected of them, the assessment for Gt. Sampford being £5 5s. 0d. (Diocesan), and £1 18s. 0d. (Central), of which we have sent to headquarters £3 13s. 0d. and for Hempstead £3 19s. 0d. and £18s. 9d. respectively, of which we have sent forward £3 9s. 5d. We trust that none will withhold one's due contribution from the monthly last-Sunday morning's offerings on the ground that the enterprises of these organizations are supererogatory or needless, for on the contrary they are most needful and insistent. And, what is more, we may be quite sure of this, that no parish will in the long run be a loser,

HARVEY MEMORIAL:

Re-building of the fallen Tower. Hempstead Church, Essex.

The following appeal has been issued, and

is in process of circulation:

The tower of Hempstead Church, Essex (see cover), fell on January 28th, 1882, and is still a heap of ruins in the Church-yard. Of the five bells, one. the tenor, was shattered by the fall; the other four escaped injury and are hung in the Church-yard. Hempstead Church, a fourteenth century structure, contains a Harvey chapel, in the vault of which the remains, "lapped in lead," of William Harvey, the discoverer of the circulation of the blood, were interred on June 26th, 1657. The body was removed from the vault and placed in a handsome marble sarcophagus provided by the Royal College of Physicians within the Church in the year 1883. It is intended to rebuild the tower as a further memorial to this great physician at a probable cost of £5,000, of which the sum of £450 has already been contributed locally. The Church is situated in a sparsely populated agricultural district, 7 miles from a railway station, and it is necessary therefore to make a far-reaching appeal. The Clergy of the Diocese, the Royal College of Physicians, and the members of the Committee have given their hearty support to the project, and appeal with confidence for the necessary funds.

It is hoped that the lay public as well as members of the medical profession will show their approval of the scheme by sending a contribution. It is estimated that a subscription of half-a-crown from each British doctor would defray the cost.
