Extracts from the Bishop's Letter.

BISHOPSCOURT,

CHELMSFORD.

January, 1932.

My Dear Friends,

May I first of all send you all my best wishes for a happy and blessed New Year. Everyone is telling us that 1932 will be a very difficult year, but even if this rather gloomy forecast proves to be true, that does not mean that happiness should be unattainable. The roots of happiness run much deeper than the mere surface of life. Happiness is not a transitory experience which changes from day to day. It is a permanent condition and it can only be enjoyed by those who have that stable equilibrium of spirit and soul which comes from a childlike and unfaltering trust in the love and care of the Heavenly Father. Consequently amongst all the changes and chances of this mortal life our hearts can surely there be fixed where true joys are to be found. May that be the experience of us all.

From time to time I have made remarks on the anxious position of the funds of the London-over-the-Border Church Fund. A special Committee is meeting to review the whole of the grants given by this fund on January 18th. May I ask the Diocese to remember this Committee earnestly in their prayers? They are faced with a most anxious, difficult and responsible task.

The need of after-helps to Confirmation Candidates has been pressing on my mind. I am drawing up a pamphlet dealing with this matter. When I had parishes of my own I used to try to meet the need myself, but I feel that there is a great deal to be said for some attempt of this kind on a larger scale. This pamph et will be ready by January 1st and if any clergy would like copies for their young people, if they will write to the Bishop's Secretary, Bishopscourt, Chelmsford, the pamphlets will be sent.

My intention in the New Year is to give these booklets to the Confirmation Candidates after the service, but if there are any parish clergy who have their own arrangements and would rather that I did not do this I shall of course gladly fall in with their wishes. I hope that this effort on my part will be the means of strengthening the spiritual life of these young people and helping them to form some definite rule for their spiritual life.

A Happy New Year to All.

Years come and go-time flies swiftlyonce more we find ourselves at the beginning of a New Year. The old year is closed as a book which we have finished reading; God has locked and sealed its pages. Whatever is left undone or forgotten-whatever of its moments has been mispent-'tis all past and gone never to be recalled—the moments have gone along into the unknown years of eternity. It is easy to form new resolutions and to talk of what we intend doing in the New Year, but it is not wisdom. It opens to us as a door into a secret chamber - we just step in and live each hour as it comes to us. God alone holds the Key of the Unknown Future and to Him we must look for guidance to tread aright the new path. We must give Him our hearts unfurnished emptied of self-so that He may enter in and abide with us and work His will thro' us.

There are many ways in which we can work for the Master—however humble our sphere. God does not call us to any great heights. He just simply says, "Follow me."

"If any man will come after me, let Him take up His cross and follow me." It may mean great hardships, poverty, pain or lone-liness. Also He says, "let him deny himself."

One of the ways in which we may do this' is to help forward the work of His Church here in our midst—to be found in His House of Prayer, each Sabbath, honouring and worshipping Him. Then there is our Missionary Society to be thought of. Let us not neglect this for He Himself said, "Go ye, and teach all nations." We cannot all go, but we can pray for those who go out to preach Christ crucified.

Those of us who have Missionary Boxes do not fully realise how great a blessing even our smallest contributions mean to them—this is one way to deny ourselves, for Christ's sake. Let us not forget our Missionary Boxes, or neglect them. As each half-year comes round, let us be ready cheerfully to hand in our boxes, so that the amount may be sent in regularly to

help forward this great work. "The World for Christ" must be the watchword of every Christian heart. So many during this year have been called to their eternal rest, who have been helping in the salvation of souls. Others are needed to take their place. At the beginning of this New Year of Grace, 1932, let us forget those things which are behind, and lay aside every weight that doth hinder us, and like St. Paul, let us "press toward the mark for the prize of our high calling of God in Christ Jesus," let us endeavour to live each for another's good—to do all that we can by our lives "to hold forth the Word of Life"-doing our duty as good citizens, in that state of life into which it has pleased God to call us-until at last our labours ended here on earth, we may enter into the joy of our Lord, and dwell with Him thro' the eternal years.

On sunny hills that lie,
Or grasses in the meadows
That blossom but to die,
O Thou, Who canst not slumber,
Whose light grows never pale,
Teach us aright to number
Our years before they fail."
