FIRE.—At 3.30 on Tuesday morning a fire was discovered in a stackyard at Phillipe Farm, belonging to Mr. Thos. Alfred Andrews. The outbreak was first seen by Mr. O. Reader, who saw the reflection of the flames from his window at Calthorpes Farm, half a mile away. Mr. Reader called Henry Foster, and together they went to the scene and aroused Mr. Andrews, who was in bed. A stack was well alight, and the men turned their attention to prevent the flames spreading to other stacks. In this they were successful, and the Saffron Walden Fire Brigade, which arrived at 6.45 a.m., under Major W. F. Ackland, found a good supply of water, and quickly had the fire under control.
