## Hempstead Soldier's Death.

Mrs. Robinson, of Hempstead, Saffron Walden, some days ago received information from a nurse at a hospital in France that her son, Pie. A. Robinson, 1st Herts. Regt., had died from wounds. Official information has also been received from the War Office. Ptc. Robinson received from the War Office. inson enlisted shortly before Christmas, 1914, and had been out in France ten months. He Robinson has received the following letter from 2nd Lieut. E. Lee, of the 1st Herrs, Regt. :-

Dear Mrs. Robinson,-Just a line how sorry I was when I heard that your son, Robinson, died of wounds in the hospital af Bethune. He was in my plateon, and was one of the best and most cheer ul men I have had to do with out here, always willing and never any sign of grumbling, and I can say that he is a great loss to the regiment, and a greater loss to the platoon he was in. He was a typical Englishman, who died as so many have, doing his duty. I will try and tell you as near as I can how he got the wound from which he died, as I well know how you and his relations will value this. It was the night of May 27th that a man in our front trench got wounded, and I was asked to send two stretcher-bearers to carry him up to the dressing station. Your son and another man went and brought the man down safely, passed my bit of treuch, and in going down the long communication treuch back to the dressing station, on the way a stray bullet hit the top of the trench and ricocheted down, hitting your son in the middle of the body. At the time it did not appear to be a very serious wound, but as the bullet had hit the earth first there was the fear of poisoning setting in. He was sent off as soon as possible by an ambulance to - Hospital, and there he stayed till he died on June 4th. I was very shocked to hear of his death, as I thought he was going on so well. He was buried in the local cemetery on June 6th, Capt. Doray, his platoon sergeant, and Sergt. Pagne, four of his pals and myself were there. It was a lovely day, and there were eight others buried that day, in the same part of the cemetery. Then we said 'good-bye' to a good comrade and a good soldier, who had made the greatest and a good soldier, who had made the greatest sacrifice, that of giving his life for his contry. If there is anything that you would like to know about him I shall be only too pleased if you will write and ask me. I am sure there are many who mourn his loss, to whom I add my sincerest condolence."
